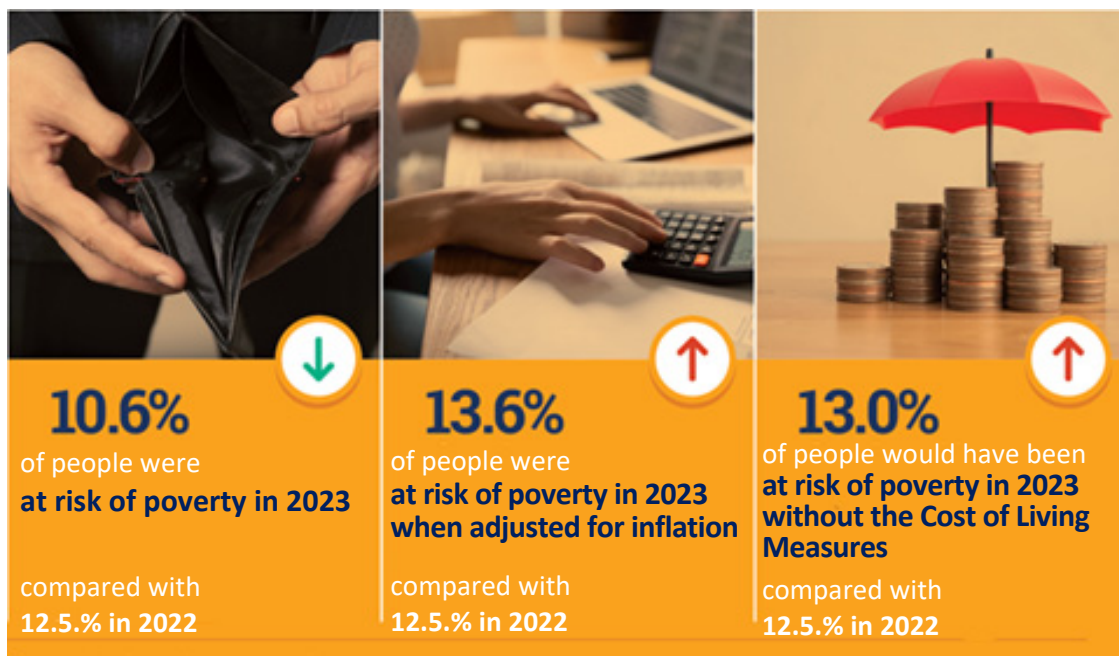

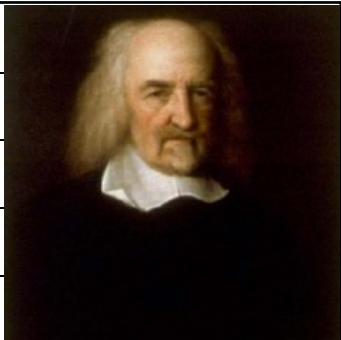

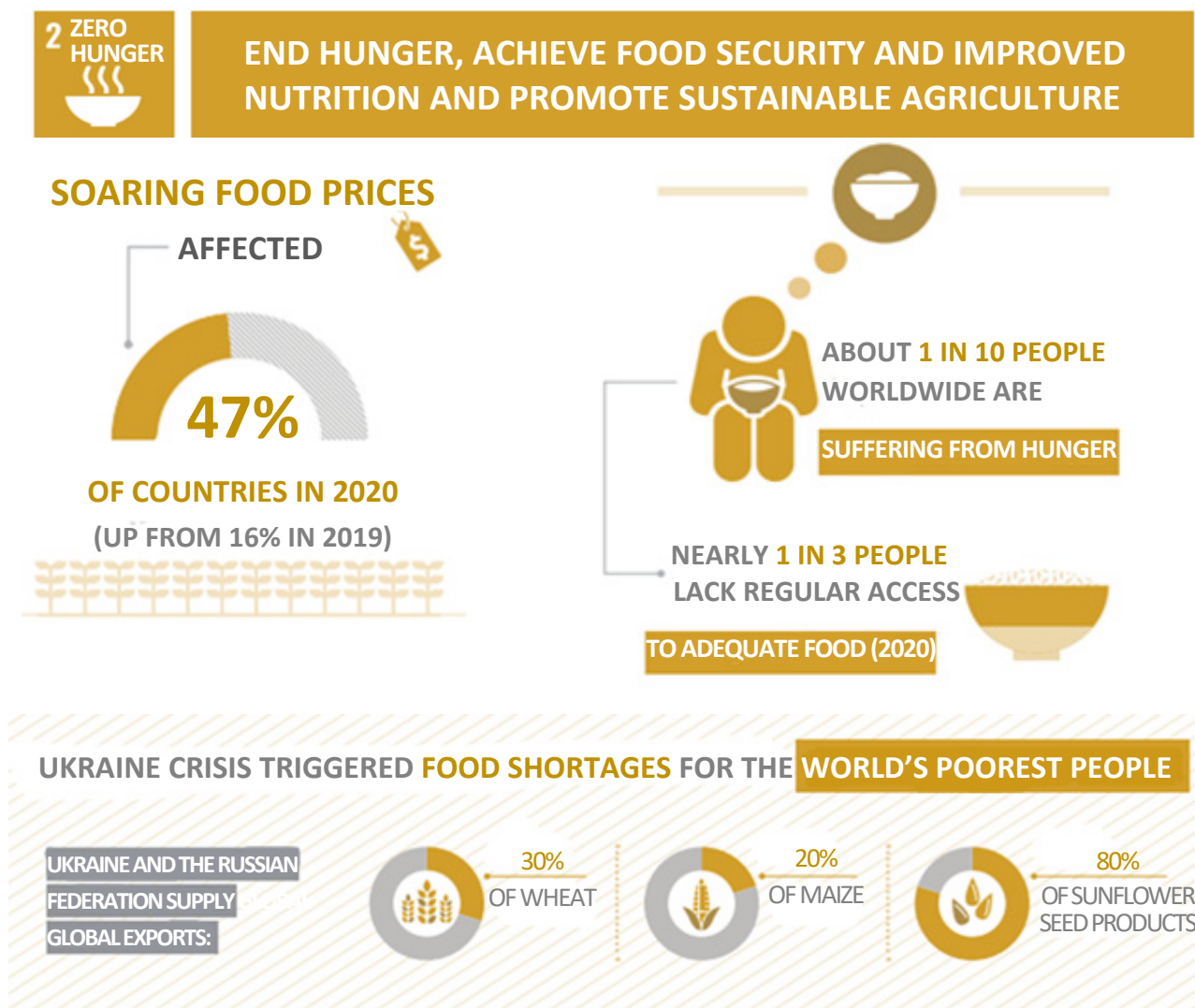

Document A: Infographic from the Sustainable Development Goals Report 2022. (Adapted)



The Sustainable Development Goals Report 2022 provides a global overview of progress on the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, using the latest available data and estimates. It tracks the global and regional progress towards the 17 Goals with in-depth analyses of selected indicators for each Goal.

According to the Report, interlinked crises are putting the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development in grave danger, along with humanity's very own survival. The Report highlights the severity of the challenges before us. The crises, dominated by COVID-19, climate change, and conflicts, are creating impacts on food and nutrition, health, education, and affecting all the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). It points out areas that need urgent action in order to rescue the SDGs and deliver meaningful progress for people and the planet by 2030.

Document B: Hunger Hotspots – Countries of Highest Concern.

Action Against Hunger - a humanitarian agency, responding to conflict, disasters and emergencies whenever they happen.



Conflict, the climate crisis and economic shocks continue to drive more and more communities around the world into a hunger crisis. That's according to the latest Hunger Hotspots report from the UN, which included Haiti, South Sudan and Sudan among the countries with the highest level of alert.

Conflict and organised violence, in particular the increased targeting of civilians, remain the key drivers of hunger around the world. This is set to worsen the already restricted access to food through the disruption of global markets. People fleeing their homes also have to leave behind their land and the chance to grow their own food.

Extreme weather intensified by the climate crisis, like excessive rainfall, droughts and cyclones, are also having a disastrous impact – leading to repeated failed harvests. Changing weather patterns, like the El Niño effect, means a forecast of increased rainfall and a greater risk of flooding. This is likely to have a negative impact in regions already facing severe challenges with crop production.



Governments around the world are struggling to protect their most vulnerable people due to high debt levels. In many countries, soaring prices for things like food, energy and transport, along with weakening currencies are likely to make the situation much worse.

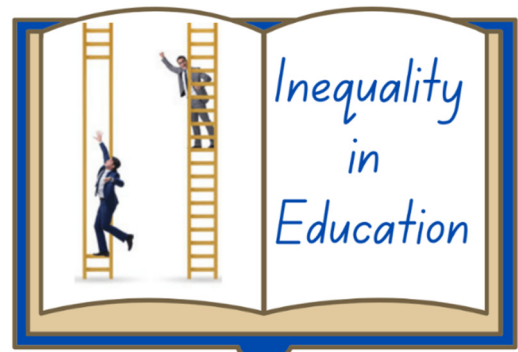
