Mark Kelly, Chief Inspector of Prisons in Ireland.

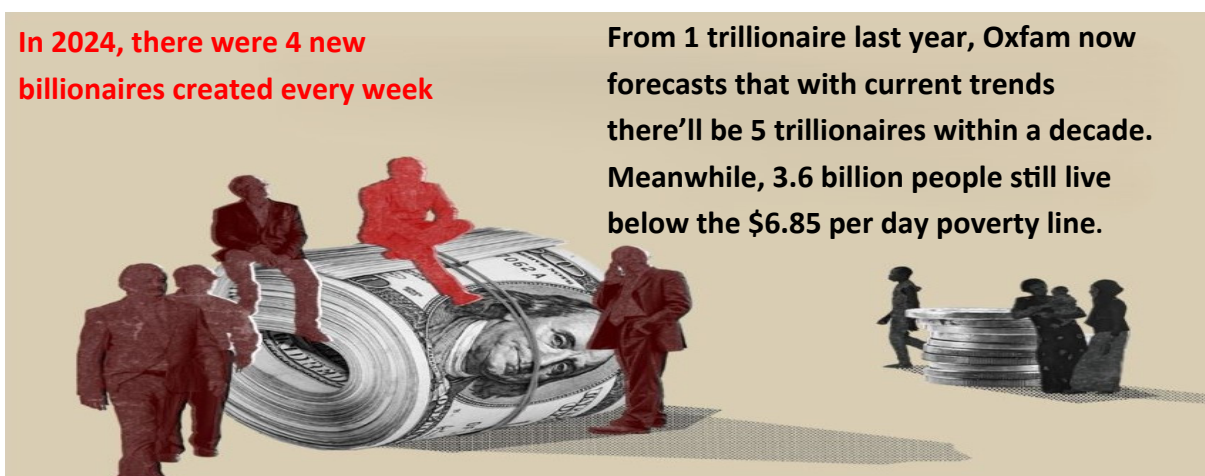

Document A: From ‘Correct the Map’: Africa takes on centuries-old ‘biggest lie’ in world geography, Anadolu Ajansı 17.09.25.

For generations, schools, media outlets and decision-makers have relied on a familiar world map - it has become a global standard. But behind its widespread use lies a major flaw: the Mercator projection presents a distorted view of the world. Now, a growing initiative led by African organizations *Africa No Filter* and *Speak Up Africa*, with support from the African Union (AU), is pushing for change. The *Correct the Map* campaign urges a shift away from the outdated projection, which artificially inflates the size of some regions while minimizing others, particularly Africa. The campaign calls for global adoption of the Equal Earth projection, which preserves proportional continent sizes and presents a fairer, more visually balanced view of the planet.

What are map projections and why do we need them?

A map projection is a method of representing the 3D surface of the Earth on a 2D plane (such as a map or screen). Since the earth is a sphere, flattening it onto a map surface inevitably introduces some sort of distortion.

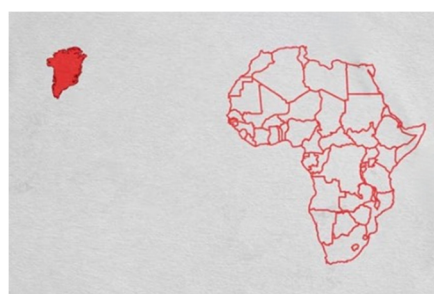
“A map decides what to highlight, what to leave out, where to place the center, and how big or small places appear,” Moky Makura, the executive director of *Africa No Filter*, told Anadolu. “Those choices create a narrative about importance, connection, and power. Mercator map shrinks Africa’s size, which downplays its importance.” Makura said the projection also reinforces colonial-era narratives, portraying Africa as small, peripheral and less significant in the global order. “It’s not just a geography issue or just a map,” she said. “It’s a narrative issue about pride and identity.” Seeing Africa minimized on maps, she warned, can subconsciously make the continent seem less important, less powerful and less worthy of attention – shaping everything from where aid is directed to how policies and investments are decided. “Maps are instruments of power. Africa is reclaiming its power.”

One of the best known and commonly used world maps, the Mercator Projection, depicts Greenland and Africa as being roughly the same size.

In reality, Africa is 14 times larger.

Document B: From Africa No Filter *Stereotypes about Africa in Britain and the United States* Research Report 2025. In collaboration with the University of Bath.



Media and developmental aid organisations often portray Africa in stereotypical ways related to lack of progress, poverty, political instability, exotic tribalism, harsh living conditions, and other negative images. Presumably, this is intended to provoke sympathy and encourage donations and willingness to help Africa progress. While they may be well-intentioned, critics – such as *Africa No Filter* – warn that these portrayals may foster overly negative perceptions of Africa, ultimately undermining its global image and economic prospects.

Western consumers might hesitate to support African businesses or cultural products if the only images that come to mind about Africa are deserts and poverty. Significant research has highlighted how the media portrays Africa as helpless and impoverished but there is surprisingly little research on how these portrayals are reflected in the perceptions of the average person in the Global North, such as the USA or UK.

There were two parts to this study.

Part 1: Stereotypes of Africa and their consequences.

A survey of 1,126 representative US and UK participants revealed that:

1. Africa's image is dominated by nature and wildlife, perpetuating outdated colonial tropes that overshadow its societal progress and cultural richness.
2. Thoughts about Africa are generally more negative compared to thoughts about Europe.
3. Negative stereotypes about Africa can be grouped into three key themes:
 - a. Hostile, uninhabitable natural environments (e.g. droughts, barren landscapes)
 - b. Societal challenges such as political instability, disease, poverty, and corruption
 - c. A perceived lack of rich culture and advanced civilization, in contrast to Europe's association with rich cultural heritage and modernity
4. These stereotypes directly explain lower interest in African products and cultural offerings in the US and UK.

Part 2: Changing the narrative of Africa versus negating negative stereotypes.

Another sample of 960 US participants showed that providing positive new information about Africa, rather than merely negating stereotypes, can effectively shift perceptions and foster greater interest in Africa's products and cultures.

Study Participants: We aimed to collect 960 US-American participants. After excluding participants with African and European backgrounds, and participants who failed attention checks, we report a sample of 863 final participants (age 18-86, average age 41.1; 36.6% male, 61.3% female, 2.1% non-binary; 89.9% White, 0.3% Black, remaining 9.8% other backgrounds).

In summary, this report shows that negative stereotypes about Africa remain widespread in the US and UK and shape how people engage with the continent. However, our research shows that sharing positive stories about Africa can shift perceptions and foster greater interest in its products, cultures, and potentials.

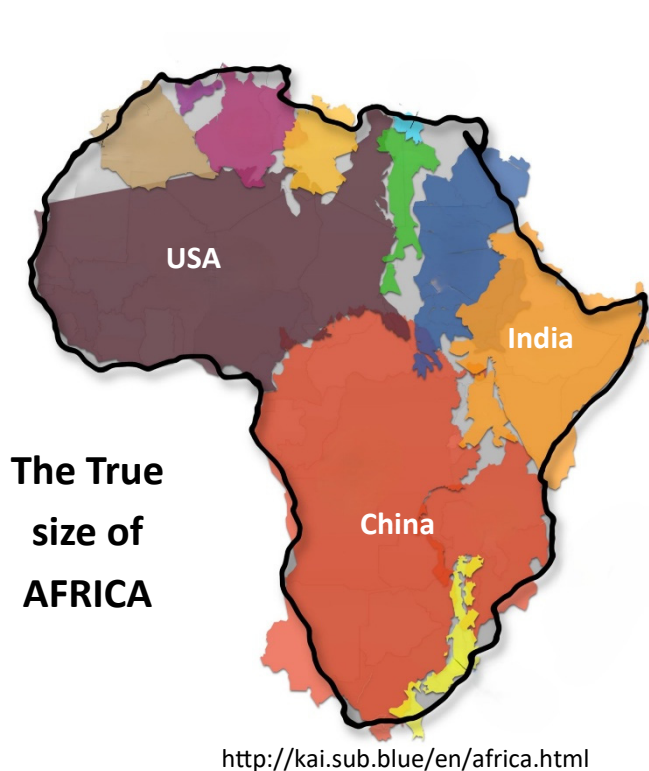

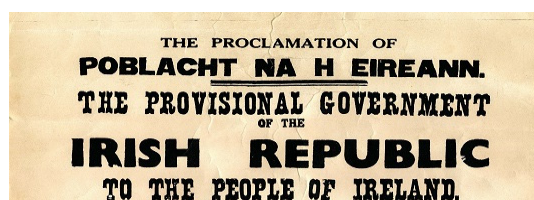
